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

The Calendar of the Papers of Benjamin Franklin prepared by laase. Minis Hays for the bicenteenial of Franklin's bith in 1909 provides access to the largest particle of the Franklin Papers at the APS. The large were originally bound into volumes in roughly chardnoglocal order, will laters to Franklin's precision growth and at the end of the collection, Franklin's letters owned by the University of Pernsylvania. Each manuscript is still identified by Hays' reference numbers, which include a roman numeral refering to the original volume followed by an rabie number to identify the folio. The electronic version of the finding aid replicates Hays' calendar, including the introductory material and Itemlevel descriptions. It has been updated to reflect corrections in the metatidatis.

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Concluding Thoughts

"In terms of the work of the stakeholders, what was at times the most frustrating part of the process in the beginning became what I valued the most in the end: the multiplicity of voices from different parts of the educational and museum communities who were involved ...
